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Rules & Guidelines

The rules below apply to all Town Properties and HHLT preserves respectively. Please refer to a property's page for any exceptions.

Town Property Rules

- No overnight parking
- Carry in, carry out, **including dog waste**
- No camping, no open fires
- Please respect private landowners' property
- Intoxicating beverages are not allowed
- Do not pick or dig any living things
- Please report any damage to the Town of Harpswell
- **Dog rules vary by location**, see individual trail pages for specifics



Harpswell Heritage Land Trust Preserve Rules

- No overnight parking
- Carry in, carry out, **including dog waste**
- No camping unless otherwise specified, no open fires
- Please respect wildlife, neighbors, and other users
- Dogs must be under owner control at all times
- These trails are designed for foot traffic only (no bicycles or motorized vehicles)

Safety Tips

Hunting Season

Many properties in Harpswell allow hunting during the fall season. Harpswell is in the expanded archery zone, so check the state website for season dates. Be sure to wear blaze orange when in the woods during hunting season. Scan the QR code for hunting season dates.



Hiking Safety Tips

- All Town and Land Trust trails in Harpswell are marked with **yellow blazes**. All cut-off trails or side trails are blazed in **blue**.
- Tell someone where you're going and when you expect to be back.
- Check the weather before you go.
- Stay on marked trails.
- Carry a trail map, water, and a whistle.
- Proper footwear is highly recommended.
- Respect other visitors, the land, and wildlife.
- If you encounter an animal acting strangely, call Animal Control at 1-800-501-1111.



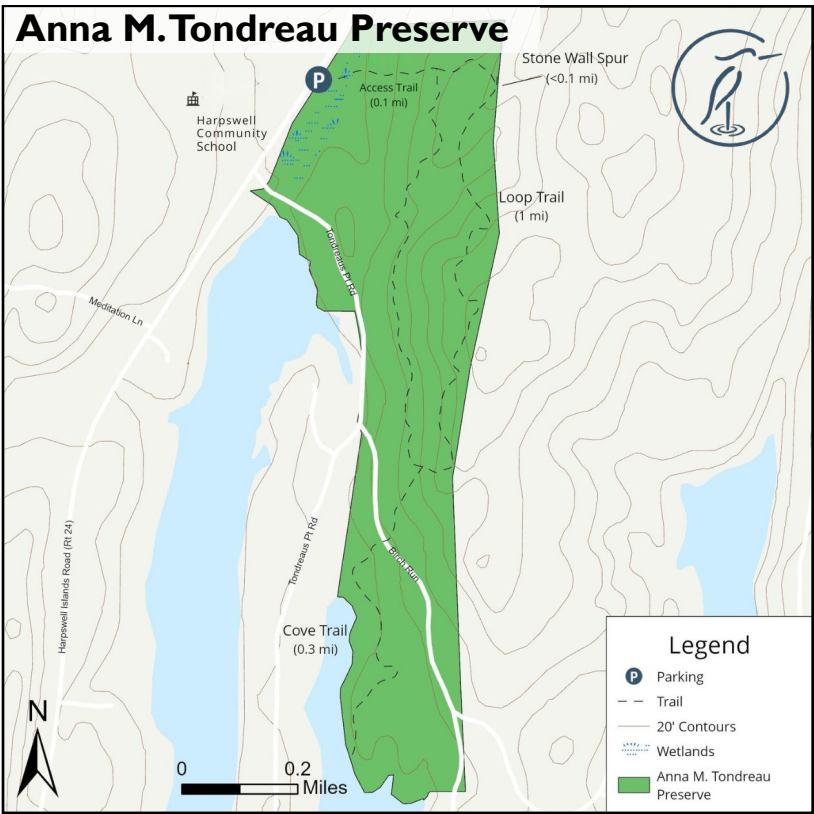
The Cliff Trail is marked every 1/10 mile with these diamond blazes. If you have an emergency, rescuers may ask what blaze you are closest to so they can determine how best to reach you.

Water Safety

- Always wear your life jacket.
- When swimming, wear brightly colored swimsuits.
- Whether swimming or boating, don't go alone!
- There are no lifeguards on duty at any of the public beaches in Harpswell. Please swim at your own risk.

Anna M. Tondreau Preserve



Anna M. Tondreau Preserve encompasses 57 acres on Great Island, including forest carpeted with moss and lichen, fascinating rock ledges and walls, and undeveloped shoreline. It runs along the saltmarsh and mudflats of Orr's Cove and Mill Cove in Quahog Bay, but it also hosts multiple small streams and a wetland. This preserve features habitat for both migrating warblers in its forests and shorebirds in its coves. Visitors can enjoy scenic views along its 1.4-mile trail system.

Location: 311 Harpswell Islands Road. Please do not drive down private Tondreau's Point Road. N43.837659 W69.912716.

- No hunting, trapping, or discharging of firearms.
- Dogs must be on leash during bird nesting season (April 15 - July 31). All other times, dogs must be under owner control and not bother wildlife, neighbors, or other users.

The main loop, Cliff Trail, is 2.2 miles and marked with yellow tree blazes. The shorter Cut-off Trail is marked with blue blazes and is an easier alternative to the main loop.

This trail features an inclusive, 0.4-mile shore walk along tidal Strawberry Creek with a view of the cascade and a resting area. Beyond the inclusive portion, the trail is a backcountry-style trail with rooty and rugged sections, elevation gain, and rock scrambling. The outer loop of the trail totals 2.2 miles and features views from 150-foot cliffs overlooking Long Reach. Please practice caution on the trail and enjoy at your own risk.

Location: 263 Mountain Road. Parking behind Town Office. Please **do not park** on Community Drive. N43.814604 W69.942879.

Additional Rules

- Dogs must be on leash at all times while on the accessible portion of the trail. On all other sections, dogs must be on leash between 10 am and 4 pm.
- Hunting is allowed.

Curtis Farm Preserve



The 1.25-mile trail system takes visitors through field, forest and to coastal bays, with scenic views along the way. The Preserve includes a large meadow, shoreline on both Curtis Cove and Basin Cove, gravel beaches, a freshwater pond, forested freshwater wetlands and 15 acres of intertidal mud flats. On a clear day, the views across Middle Bay, as far west as Mt. Washington are impressive. The trail around the field to the “pebble” is worth a visit, and an accessible picnic area on Basin Cove offers a place for rest and relaxation.

Location: Parking lots at 1554 Harpswell Neck Road and 104 Basin Point Road. N43.76181 W70.01372.

- Dogs must be on leash during bird nesting season (April 15 - July 31). All other times, dogs must be under owner control and not bother wildlife, neighbors, or other users.
- Hunting is allowed.
- Trapping is allowed with written permission from HHLT.
- Power driven mobility devices are allowed on trail south of Basin Pt Rd.

The Devil's Back Trails on Orr's Island comprises two trails. The West side trail winds through mixed forest, including everything from old growth pines to a few hardy apple trees. The Byles Point North Loop trail descends to Long Cove, providing numerous views of the water. The East Side Trail runs along Gun Point Cove. There are many spots to stop and enjoy the water view, including Seal Rock where, at half tide or lower, seals might be swimming, fishing, and sun bathing. Be on the lookout for ospreys nestled in large "stick nests," or soaring over the cove looking for fish to eat.

Hackett and Minot Trails



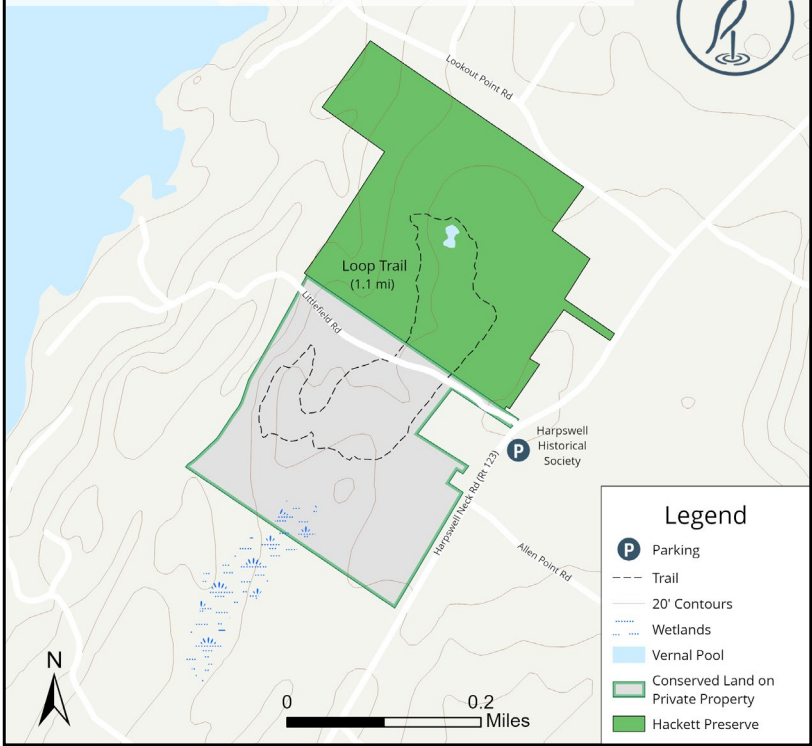

The Hackett and Minot Trails take visitors through a verdant, mossy forest with numerous lichen and club-moss glades, as well as a vernal pool. It's a great place for a quiet woods walk.

The vernal pool forms in a low-lying area of the forest, where water can collect in the spring and dry out in late summer. Vernal pools provide important breeding habitat for wood frogs, spotted salamanders and other animals. Animals lay their eggs here because the pool is isolated and temporary, and predators such as fish don't live here.

Location: Park at Harpswell Historical Society, 929 Harpswell Neck Road. Please do not drive down private Littlefield Road. N43.799352 W69.987680.

Additional Rules

- Dogs must be on leash during bird nesting season (April 15 - July 31). All other times, dogs must be under owner control and not bother wildlife, neighbors, or other users.
- Open dawn to dusk.

Houghton Graves Park

Located in the middle of Orr's Island village, Houghton Graves Park provides visitors a breath of fresh air. Mowed grassy paths lead to picnic tables, views of beautiful Beal's Cove on Harpswell Sound and provide access to the shore.

This three-acre "pocket park" is a great place to spend a few minutes, or a few hours. Given to the Harpswell Heritage Land Trust by Russell Houghton and Patty and Allan Graves in 2007, this park will forever be available for the enjoyment of both residents and visitors.

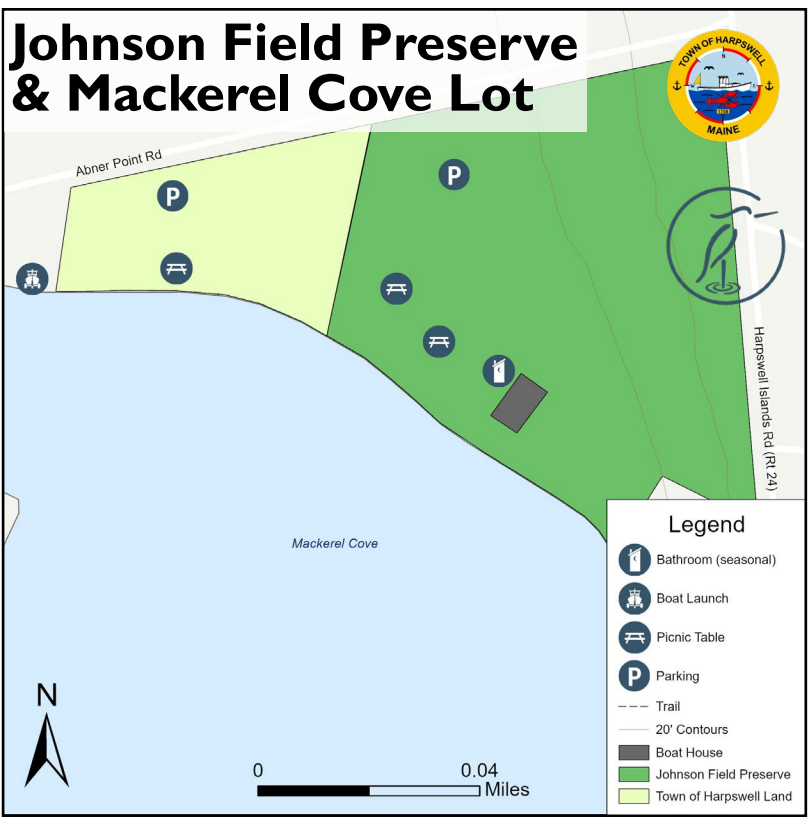

Johnson Field Preserve & Mackerel Cove Lot



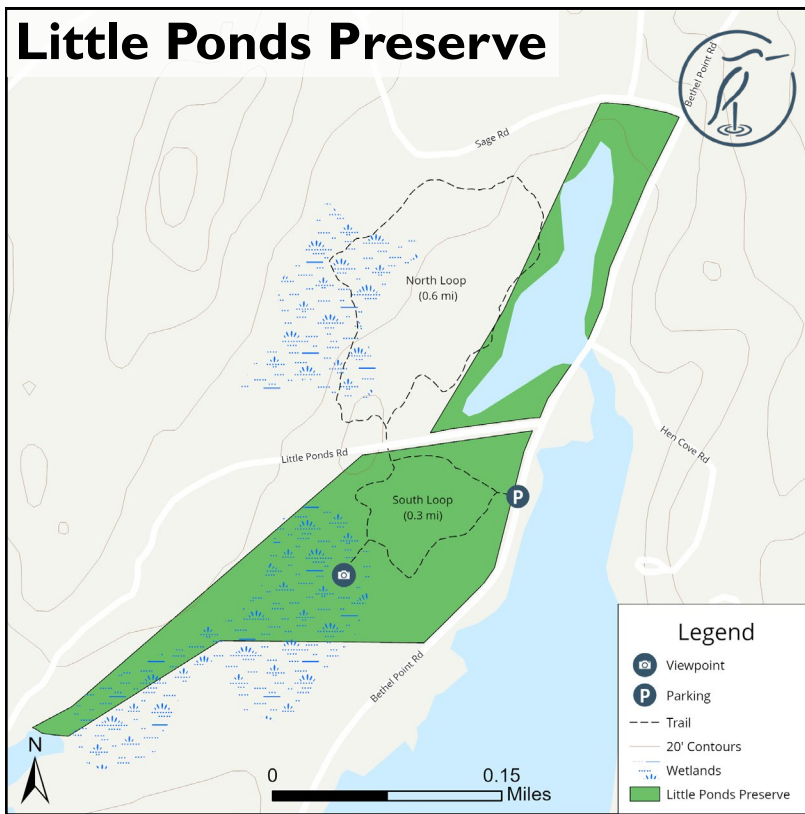
The open field at the head of Mackerel Cove has been a Bailey Island landmark for generations. Overlooking one of Maine’s most scenic harbors, Johnson Field Preserve, owned by HHLT, and Mackerel Cove Lot, owned by the Town of Harpswell, offer visitors a place for family picnics, wintertime sledding, access to the beach, and spectacular views. This is a great place to launch a kayak or canoe. Fishermen use part of the lot for seasonal storage. The Land Trust preserve can be rented for special events.

Location: 13 Abner Point Road, Bailey Island. N43.731621 W69.997548.

Additional Rules

- No hunting, trapping, or discharging of firearms.
- Power driven mobility devices are allowed on mowed areas.

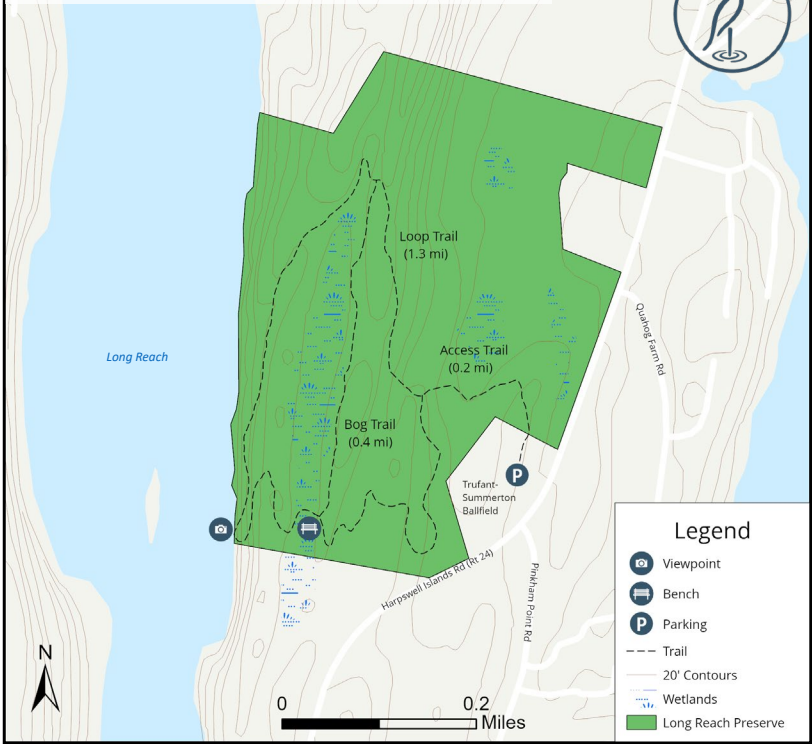
The easy trail on this 22-acre preserve is perfect for anyone looking for a peaceful walk or some bird watching. Tiemer Pond, now a cattail marsh, provides foraging and nesting habitat for several bird species. Mill Pond's intertidal mud flats at the head of Hen Cove provide habitat for shorebirds, wading birds, numerous invertebrates, and soft-shell clams. The south loop offers views of the cattail marsh while the north loop is on private property and follows the edge of Mill Pond before turning back into the forest.

Long Reach Preserve

This spectacular 95-acre preserve provides one of the longest hiking trails in Harpswell. A challenging 1.5-mile loop trail winds through several different forest types, passes a peat bog nestled between two prominent bedrock ridges, and finally descends to the shores of Long Reach. For a shorter hike, take the bog trail.

Long Reach itself is a submerged valley, and at low tide, exposed mudflats. From the shore, visitors can look across to dramatic cliffs of weathered bedrock, at the top of which is the Cliff Trail.

Location: 648 Harpswell Islands Road. This preserve shares a parking lot with Trufant Summerton Field. N43.814931 W69.923896.

Additional Rules

- Dogs must be on leash during bird nesting season (April 15 - July 31). All other times, dogs must be under owner control and not bother wildlife, neighbors, or other users.
- Hunting is allowed. Trapping is allowed with written permission from HHLT.

For a variety of recreational offerings, Mitchell Field can't be beat. This former U.S. Navy fuel depot was transferred to the Town in 2001, and boasts several miles of paved and gravel paths, a rocky beach, a bandstand that hosts outdoor concerts, and the Harpswell Community Garden. The 1.6-mile perimeter path is for pedestrians and bikes only.

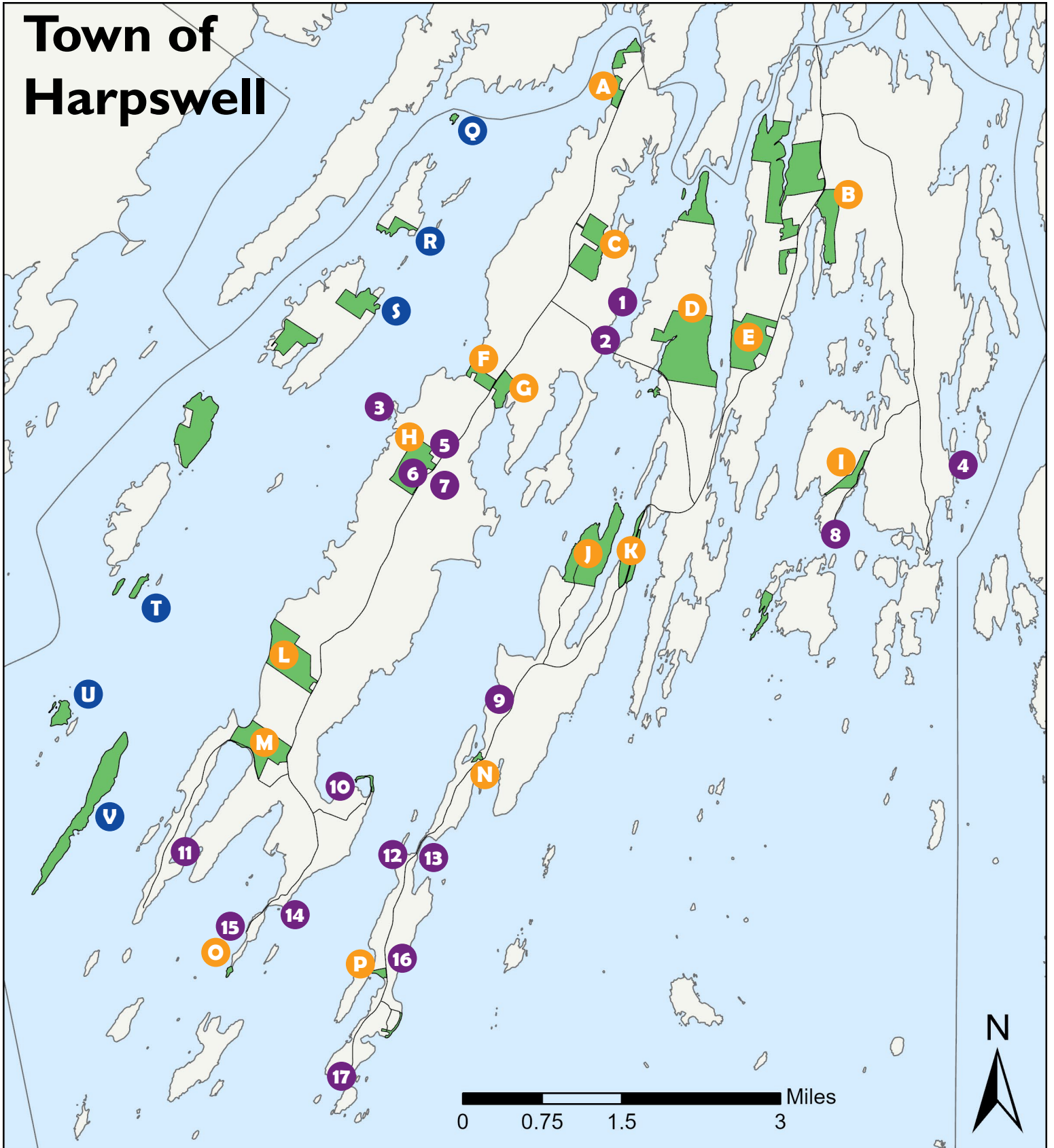
It's a great place for walking, bicycling, swimming, playing on the beach, cross-country skiing, picnicking, and so much more. On clear days, you can see Mount Washington 80 miles to the west. A new, public boat launch will open in 2026. Boat trailers can be parked by the Bandstand.

Location: 1410 Harpswell Neck Road. N43.771211 W70.008891.

Additional Rules

- Dogs must be on leash from 10am to 4pm except to swim. No dogs on the beach north of the boat launch.
- Overnight parking with permit only. Apply online.
- No lifeguards on duty. Swim at your own risk.

Otter Brook Preserve

Otter Brook Preserve runs alongside one of the largest freshwater streams in Harpswell. This freshwater marsh, stream, and pond system is a scarce resource in our coastal community.

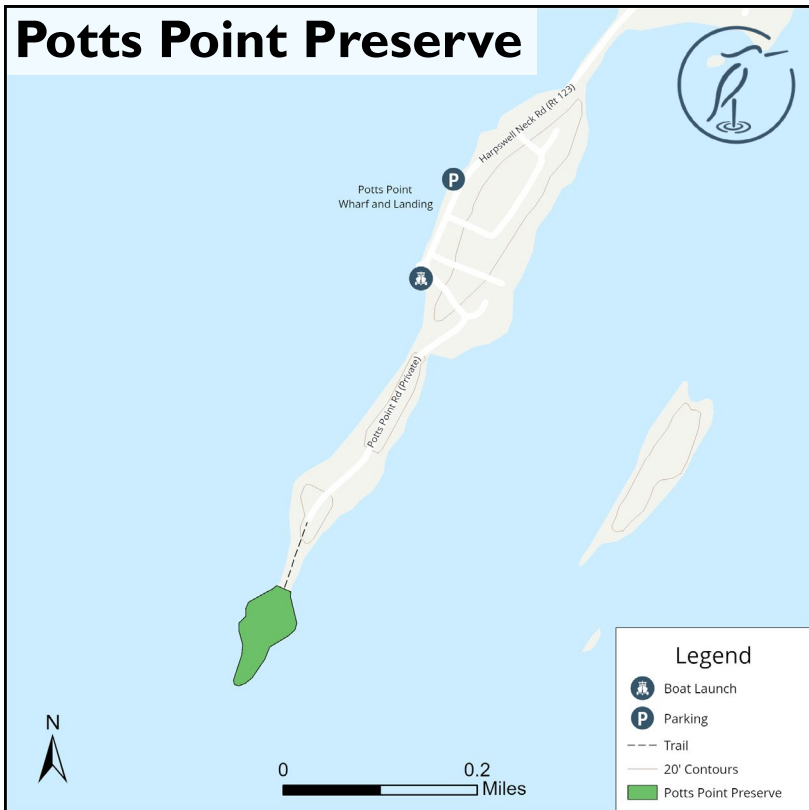
Trails meander through the forest and provide 1.7 miles of pleasant walking, cross country skiing and snowshoeing. Visitors here enjoy quiet woods trails and glimpses of the brook and the wildlife that rely on it, including great blue herons, ducks, and dragonflies.

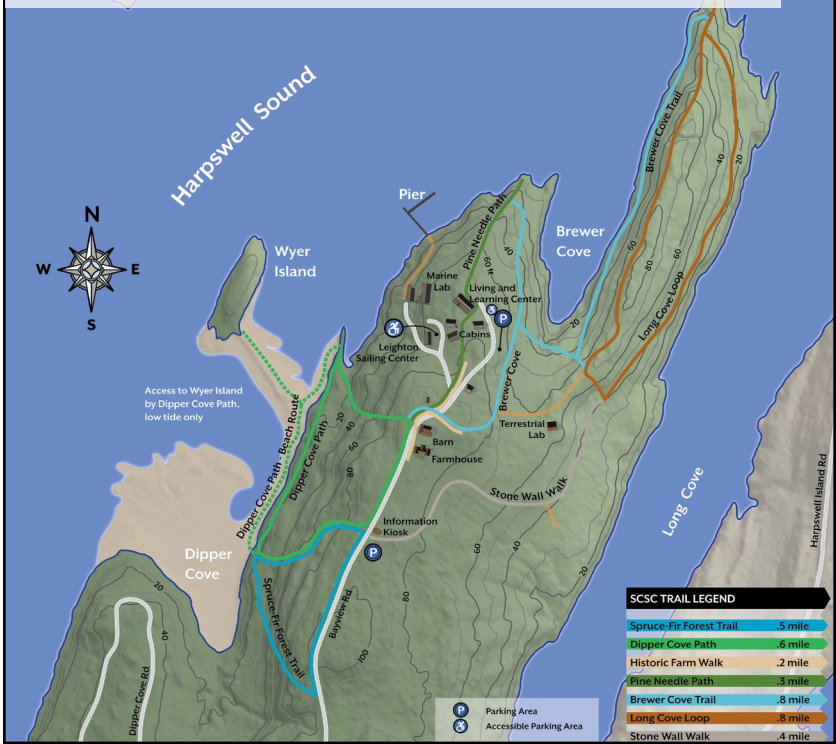
If you love exploring the ocean shoreline, this tiny preserve has just about everything you could want. There are extensive tide pools to explore, a gravel beach and dramatic views of Casco Bay. Standing at the southern tip of the preserve, you can enjoy an unparalleled view of a number of the islands that make Casco Bay so special including: Haskell, Pinkham, Bailey, Upper Flag, Thrumcap, and Eagle Islands. This is a great place to explore with your family, relax on the beach, take a swim, or read a good book.

Location: Park at the Town Dock, 1987 Harpswell Neck Road. Please do not block any residences or business along Harpswell Neck Road. Please **do not drive** on Potts Point Road, there is no parking there. Visitors should park in the public spaces at the Town Dock and walk along the road to the preserve. N43.738269 W70.021078.

Additional Rules

- Dogs must be on leash while on private Potts Point Road. All other times, dogs must be under owner control and not bother wildlife, neighbors, or other users.
- No hunting, trapping, or discharging of firearms.
- No trap, float, or boat storage.

Schiller Coastal Studies Center



This Bowdoin College facility includes walking access to miles of coastal habitat (rocky intertidal, cobble beach, soft sediment, and subtidal eelgrass), as well as water access to exposed rocky environments and the Kennebec and New Meadows estuaries.

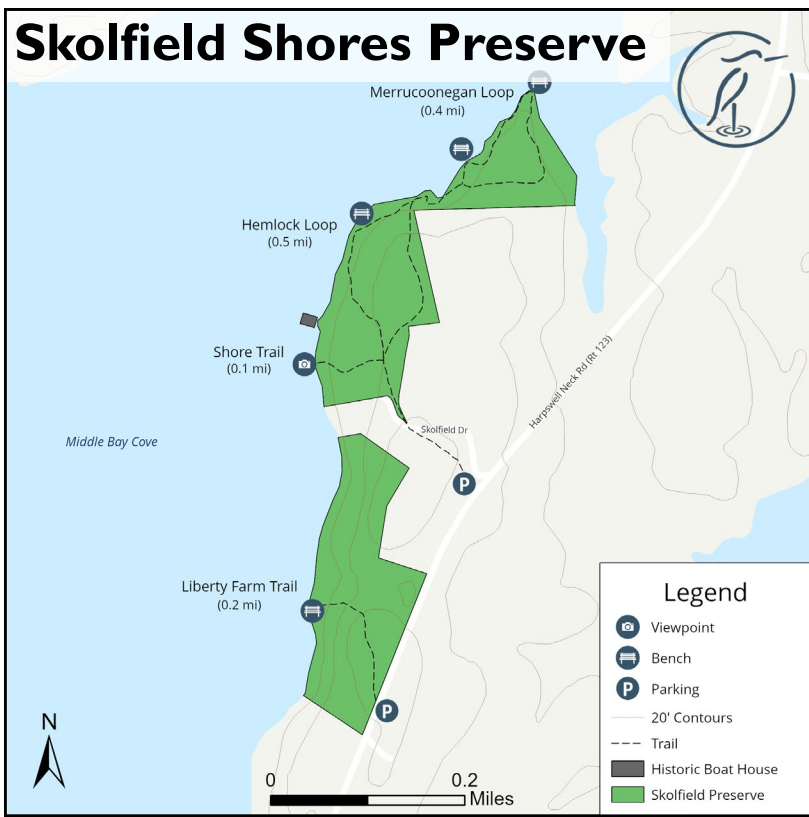
Guidelines for Trail Use

- These trails are designed for foot traffic only (no bicycles or motorized vehicles).
- Ongoing research takes place here. Please respect any flags, markings, or other scientific equipment.
- Please do not collect anything from the center.
- Dogs must be on a leash and stay on the main trails. Please carry out any waste left by pets.
- Hunting is strictly forbidden on the property.
- No camping, smoking, or fires are allowed on the property.

With fields, salt marsh, and more than 4,000 feet of shoreline on Middle Bay Cove, Skolfield Shores Preserve is well-suited for a pleasant walk or spotting a wide range of birds, from meadowlarks to terns. The main trail system includes the Hemlock Loop and the Merrucoonegan Loop. For a total of one mile, these loops wind through varied forest habitat and provide views of the cove, the salt marsh separating Brunswick and Harpswell, and the fields of historic Merrucoonegan Farm. A spur trail leads to a turn-of-the-century boathouse along the shore. Horseshoe crabs can be seen coming to shore to lay their eggs in May and June.

Widgeon Cove Trail

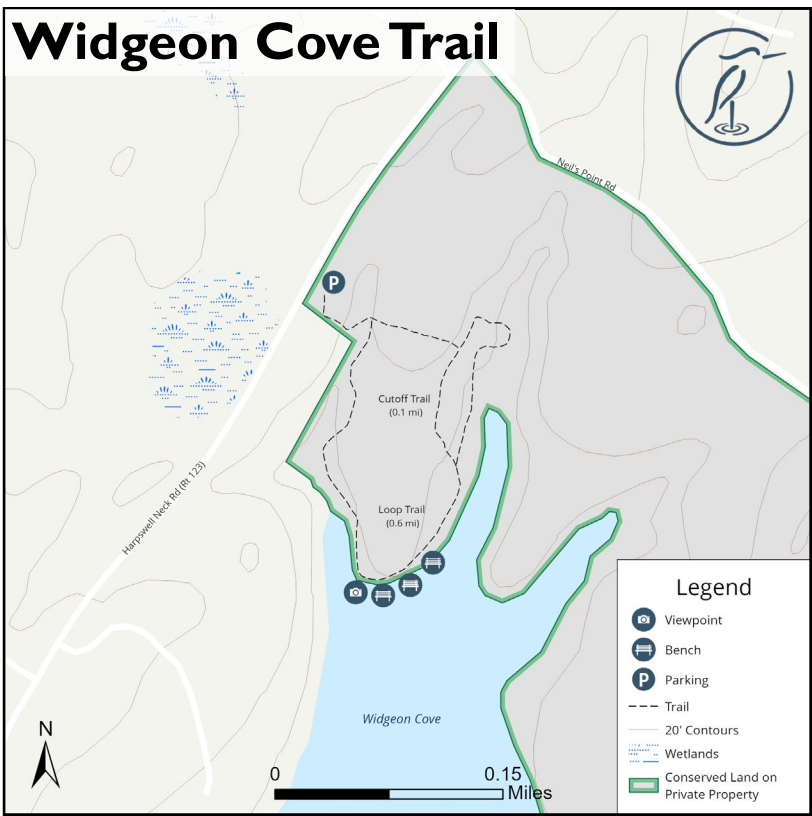

This short loop trail is the perfect way to take in beautiful Widgeon Cove on Harpswell Sound. The path winds through woodlands, across ravines, and along the shoreline where there are dramatic views of the cove.

At these scenic viewpoints, visitors can enjoy a picnic with family and friends, take pictures, or just sit quietly to observe waterfowl, wading birds, and other wildlife. The Widgeon Cove Trail is part of the 88-acre Dunning Farm Conservation Easement.

- No hunting, trapping, or discharging of firearms.
- This trail is on private property. Please respect the owner's privacy.
- Open dawn to dusk.

Wilson's Cove Trail

This short out-and-back trail brings hikers to a dramatic cliff overlooking Wilson's Cove. The views up and down Middle Bay and across to Birch Island are spectacular. The end of the trail provides a quiet place to sit beneath the red oaks and take in the water, land, and sky. On a still day, the reflection along the shore shimmers on the water and the retreating tide reveals seaweed-covered rocks for resting gulls and cormorants. The Wilson's Cove Trail is on privately owned land that is protected forever by a conservation easement.

Additional Rules

- Stay on the trail.
- Dogs must be on leash at all times.
- No hunting, trapping, or discharging of firearms.
- This trail is on private property. Please respect the owner's privacy.
- Open dawn to dusk.

Harpswell's Islands



Crow Island Preserve, Harpswell Heritage Land Trust

Crow Island Preserve in Upper Middle Bay is accessible by small boat at half tide or higher. The island is open for camping (first come, first served), but please visit after July 1 to protect the osprey in residence during nesting season.



The Goslings, Maine Coast Heritage Trust

These small islands are connected by a sandbar at low tide, and are a great spot for day use and camping. Please note that these camp sites are very popular in summer. Please anchor as all moorings are private. See MCHT's website for information on camping and preserve guidelines. www.mcht.org.



Helen and Walter Norton Preserve, Harpswell Heritage Land Trust

This area is mostly wild with a 0.75-mile loop trail through the woods. The island is open for day use and camping (first come, first served), with a shed available for rain shelter if needed. Fires are not permitted anywhere on the property. The beach provides easy, all-tide access for small boats.



Little Whaleboat Island, Maine Coast Heritage Trust

This island was protected in 2021 and is open for day use and camping. See MCHT's website for information on camping and preserve guidelines. www.mcht.org.



White Island, Harpswell Heritage Land Trust

While difficult to land due to a steep shore, White Island is a great place to view a variety of birds or explore the extensive mudflats at low tide. A few rocky outcroppings can be landed on at half-tide or higher. Camping and fires are not allowed.



Whaleboat Island, Maine Coast Heritage Trust

Whaleboat Island is the largest undeveloped island in Casco Bay. It is open for day use and camping. Some camping requires reservations. See MCHT's website for details. www.mcht.org.



Town Boat Launches

8 Bethel Point, Cundy's Harbor 350 Bethel Point Rd. N43.79092 W69.91183

This is a public and commercial launch. There is limited parking. Permit parking is issued by the town, as well as ample parking in the nearby commercial lot, which requires a small fee.



12 Garrison Cove, Bailey Island 58 Garrison Cove Rd. N43.74771 W69.991186

This landing is paved with a great beach for swimming and walking. Limited parking at the top of the beach.



14 Graveyard Point, Harpswell Neck 25 Graveyard Point Rd. N43.74058 W70.01530

This gravel beach is a great spot to launch a canoe or kayak. There is a picnic area with a table and benches. Parking is limited.



1 Hildreth Road, Harpswell Neck 56 Hildreth Rd. N43.82138 W69.95183

There is very limited parking on Hildreth Rd. The traditionally used launch point is down the gravel road. There is no public beach access. Please respect the private owners rights at the end of the gravel road. Parallel parking for up to five cars.



4 Holbrook Street Landing, Cundy's Harbor 73 Holbrook St. N43.79929 W69.88821

Located off the east side of Cundy's Harbor Rd, this gently sloped boat launch offers limited parking.













3 Lookout Point, Harpswell Neck 135 Lookout Point Rd. N43.80825 W69.99354

Even by car, Lookout Point is worth a visit. There is a picnic area and parking for up to six cars. Other use considerations are posted at the landing.



Town Boat Launches

- P** **Mackerel Cove, Bailey Island** 33 Abner Point Rd. N43.73142 W69.99837
This heavily-used landing provides recreational and commercial access to the busy harbor on Mackerel Cove. Public parking available. The landing is next to Johnson Field Preserve and Mackerel Cove Lot.  
- L** **Mitchell Field, Harpswell Neck** 1410 Harpswell Neck Rd. N43.771211 W70.008891
A new boat launch will open at Mitchell Field in 2026. There is plenty of public parking available. See the Mitchell Field page for more information.  
- 15** **Potts Point Landing/Town Dock, Harpswell Neck** 1985 Harpswell Neck Rd. N43.738269 W70.021078
The Town Dock allows boats to tie up for 30 minutes. Limited public parking. The Dock was damaged in 2024 and will be rebuilt.  
- 10** **Stover's Cove Road, Harpswell Neck** 36 Stovers Cove Rd. N43.75470 W70.00642
Located on Harpswell Harbor, this well-paved, low angle boat launch is a great way to access the harbor during high tide. There is no parking here.  
- 11** **Tide Mill/Grist Mill Road, Harpswell Neck** 14 Grist Mill Land. N43.74830 W70.03297
Former site of the George Trues Grist Mill, built in 1867, which operated through use of tidal power. The remains of the dam which used to power the mill have created a reversing falls effect. This property has a bench. Parking for up to four cars. 
- 2** **Wharf Road, Harpswell Neck** 40 Wharf Rd. N43.81790 W69.95347
Located on Ewing Narrows, there is designated parking for ONE car. 

Historic Landmarks

16 **Bailey Island Library Hall**
2167 Harpswell Islands Road, Bailey Island

This historic building was built in 1911-1912 and was designed by New York City Architectural Firm Mann & MacNeille. Originally built as a lending library and social hall, it now only serves the latter function, and can be rented out for events.

6 **Centennial Hall**
936 Harpswell Neck Rd, Harpswell Neck

Built on the 100th birthday of the United States by 100 local subscribers, this hall is used for art shows, theatrical presentations, and events. Its garden is maintained by the Harpswell Garden Club.

13 **Cribstone Bridge, Orr's & Bailey Islands**
Built in 1927-28, this bridge is 1,150 feet long and spans the waterway known as Will's Gut. The open crib work allows for the ebb and flow of the tide. The bridge is recognized as a historic civil engineering landmark and is on the National Register of Historic Places.

7 **Harpswell Historical Society Museum**
929 Harpswell Neck Road, Harpswell Neck

The Museum is home to displays featuring each of Harpswell's unique communities, the town's fishing and ship building industries, a rotating art exhibit, antique farming equipment, and old military uniforms.

17 **Lobsterman Statue**
2391 Harpswell Islands Road, Bailey Island

Erected in 1976, the statue represents the likeness of H. Elroy Johnson. The original statue was displayed at the World's Fair in 1939-1940. The replica is now displayed prominently at Land's End on Bailey Island.

5 **Old Meeting House**
917 Harpswell Neck Road, Harpswell Neck

Completed in 1759, this historic building served the town as a meeting house, place of worship, and administrative offices for more than two centuries. Although owned by the Town, the Historical Society now maintains the building and the Town's original cemetery.

Areas for Play

Harpswell Community School

308 Harpswell Islands Road

A playground is available outside of school hours. The hill in front of the school is also a popular sledding spot in the wintertime.



Trufant-Summerton Athletic Field

648 Harpswell Islands Road

Available for use anytime, unless Town activities are being conducted.

Harpswell Neck Physical Education Association

897 Harpswell Neck Road

A small playground, basketball court, and tennis/pickleball courts. This property is managed by HNPEA. www.hnpea.me



Public Restrooms (port-a-potties)

Mitchell Field

1410 Harpswell Neck Road

At the entrance and down by the water. (Seasonal, April to November)

Cliff Trail

263 Mountain Road

Pump-out Stations

New Meadows River, Cundy's Harbor

Harpswell has a seasonal, self-service pump-out float moored in Cundy's Harbor. This facility contributes to cleaning up the New Meadows River and is monitored by the Town of Harpswell. There is no fee to use this facility, but donations can be sent to the Town of Harpswell, PO Box 39, Harpswell ME 04079. Dolphin Marina, Potts Harbor

The marina is located on the lower western side of Potts Harbor. This station is owned by the marina and is available for public use for a small fee. For more information, visit www.dolphinmarinaandrestaurant.com or contact the marina at 207-833-5343.

Safe Harbor Great Island, Quahog Bay
